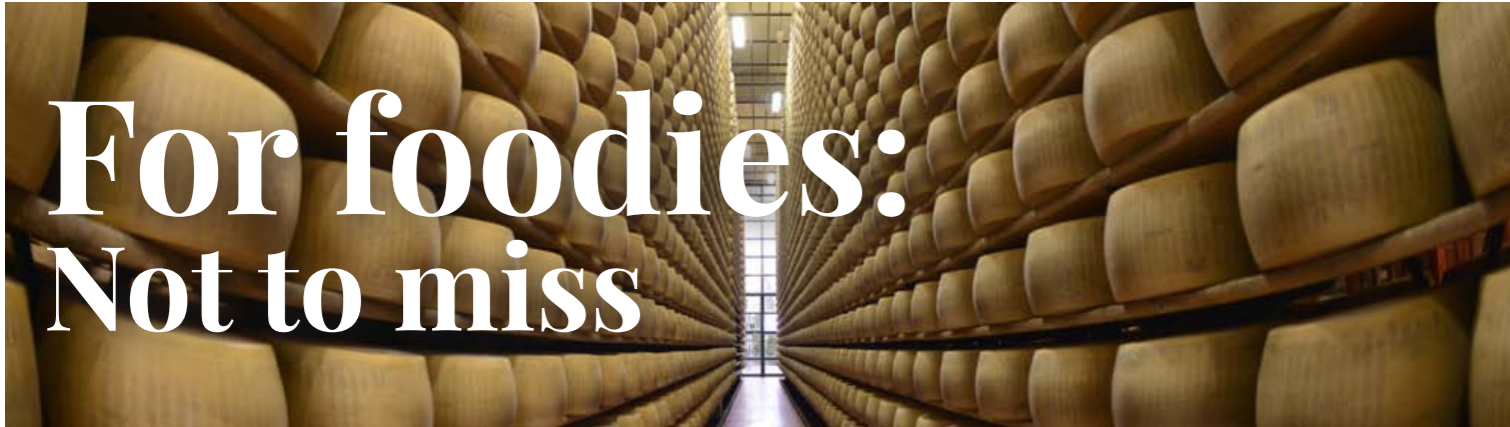

# For foodies: Not to miss

## Parmesan in Parma

Parmigiano-Reggiano, or Parmesan, has been called the 'King of Cheeses', and even by some, a "practically perfect food". With that review, it would be rude not to sample some while in Italy, and if you're in Parma, it borders on treasonous not to have a taste.

While in the region there are plenty of ways to experience this delicacy, one of which is on Curioseety's Parmigiano Reggiano cheese tasting tour. The tour takes travellers behind how the cheese is made, across a two-hour visit around a cheese factory in Parma. The tour is capped off with a cheese tasting,

accompanied by local wine and honey. The perfect ending!

For those who prefer a tad more autonomy, Maestro Travel Experience offers a self-drive tour, which in addition to the traditional flavours of Parmesan, also includes prosciutto, another of Parma's most popular exports. For those wanting to go the extra mile on this tour, you can also add on a visit to an ancient vinegar production house, where waiting for you is balsamic vinegar of a variety of different ages – another of Parma's most famous gastronomic productions.

## Come back and play!

Destination Gold Coast is eagerly anticipating the reopening of the Queensland border, and has launched its biggest ever domestic campaign to entice travellers to return in the hope of revitalising the region's \$6 billion tourism economy.

The *Come Back and Play* initiative includes a partnership with Accor Hotels, with affordable deals at Gold Coast Peppers, Mantra and BreakFree hotels, resorts and apartments.

Next weekend a special 32-page printed supplement will feature in Brisbane, Sydney and Adelaide newspapers,

and the campaign also includes TV and radio ads as well as digital billboards and in social media.

Gold Coast Mayor Tom Tate said "we are open for business and as the country continues to open up we hope our tourism operators enjoy a bumper summer".

## P&O to grow

P&O Cruises is gearing up for the return of cruising, bringing forward the arrival of two new ships which will now join the fleet in the first half of 2021.

The new *Pacific Adventure* and *Pacific Encounter* - both former Princess Cruises ships - will join *Pacific Explorer*, with cruises now on sale

aboard all three vessels.

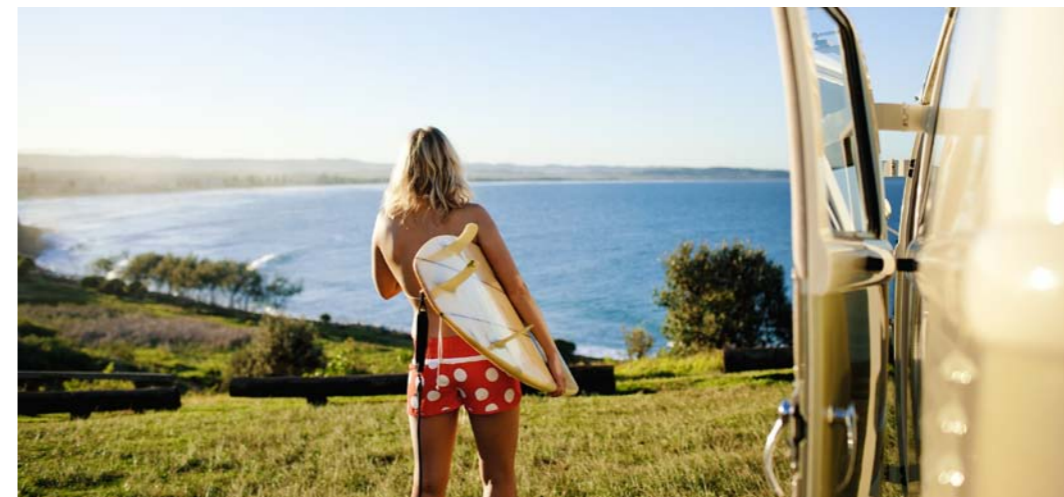
The company said the additions represented a step-change for its local operation and a sign of confidence in the Australian cruise market.

"This investment in our fleet is a demonstration that P&O Cruises Australia is ready to lead the industry in bouncing back when government and health authorities agree it is appropriate to begin sailing again with protocols in place," said P&O Australia President Sture Myrmell.

"It is also a mark of respect for our many loyal guests as well as crew, fresh food suppliers, entertainers and musicians, shore tour operators and port logistics partners," he added.

# Grab a break from the bustle

The truly difficult prospect for surfers in Australia is not trying to find the perfect break, but rather choosing which of the thousands of amazing spots to explore first. As Adam Bishop discovers, the country's seemingly endless rugged coastal terrain makes for a tantalising range of reefs and surf spots to check out, with famed points located in every state, guaranteed to suit the tastes of all levels of board rider.

## Lennox Head, NSW

Considered one of the country's best right handers, the waves at Lennox Head are not for the faint-hearted. Expert riders describe the break here as one of the fastest in the state, delivering a long sweeping surf with plenty of barrels along the way. Only the experienced should attempt the swell at Lennox however, especially when the bigger waves are rumbling in on the back of the north easterly/southern winds. Occasionally the NE winds will combine with SW and result in what the hardcore surfers describe as "primo" conditions, creating a more unpredictable bendy journey reserved for the canny and courageous riders willing to see them out to the end. For the amateurs looking for a ride, Lennox Head still offers some decent value though, with plenty of

smaller beach breaks nearby to play around with in the shallows.

## Bells Beach, Victoria

This beach is a must-visit for riders, not just because it was depicted in the final scene of surfing cinematic royalty Point Break (actually filmed in Cannon Beach Oregon), but also because it is renowned as one of the best breaks in the Southern Hemisphere. Bells Beach in Victoria is best known for hosting a range of professional competitions, such as Rip Curl Pro Bells Beach, and has been a popular place to hang ten going back a long time. Even before the Second World War broke out, adventurers from Torquay would make their way to Bells through what was a fairly inhospitable coastline at the time to take on the brutal swell. That all changed

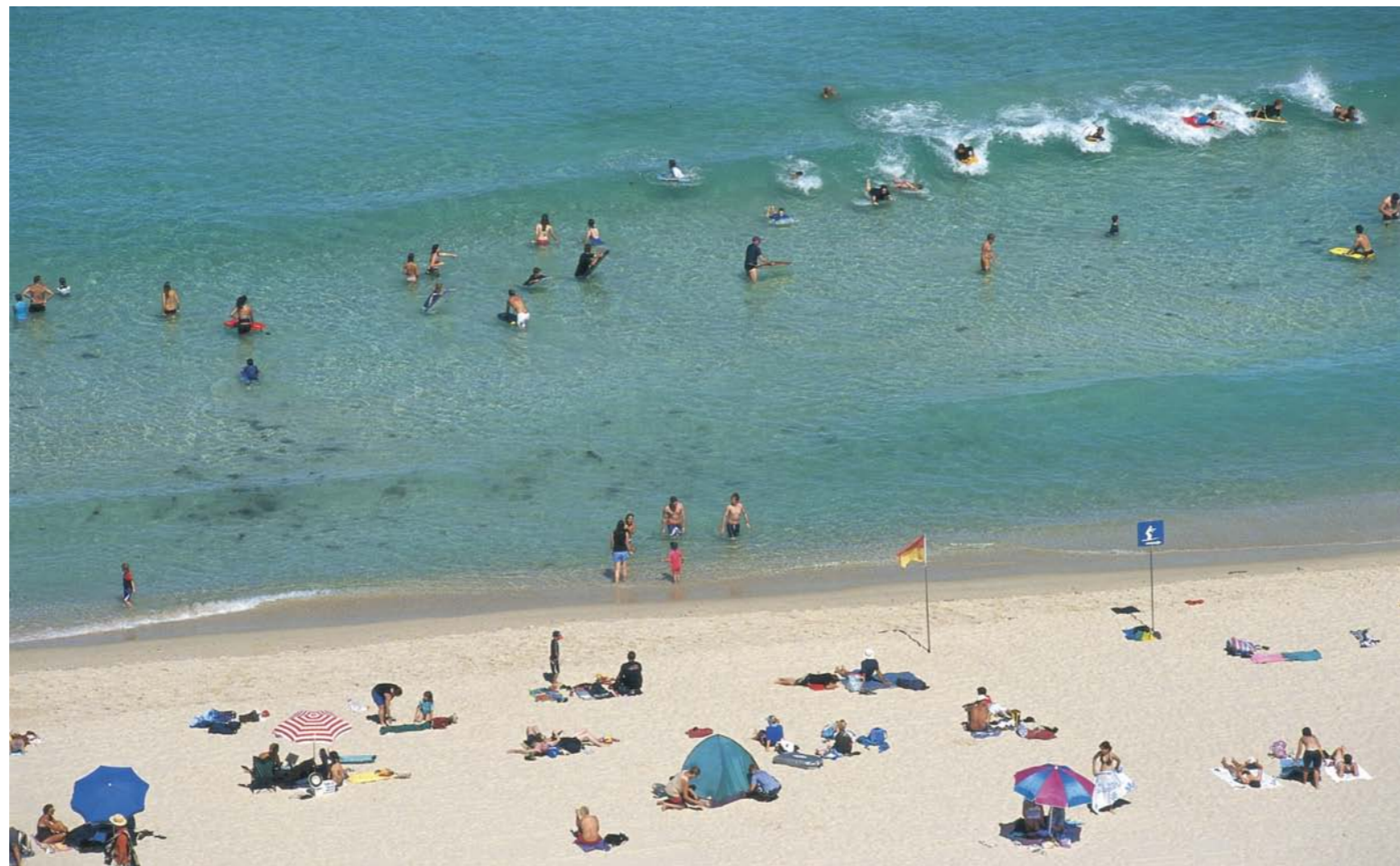
in 1960, when Olympic wrestler Joe Sweeney hired a bulldozer and cleared a road along the Bells cliff, forever making this break more accessible to the mainstream surfing community. These days, it's easy to enjoy Bells' booming swells that crunch between its iconic red clay cliffs. The best conditions are in the autumn at Bells, located an 80-minute drive from Melbourne.

## Kirra Beach, Queensland

This beautiful boomerang shaped beach was once home to the great Mark Occhilupo, winner of the Rip Curl Pro tour at Bells Beach in 1998. This beach is no stranger to some great swells, with locals labelling it the spiritual home of the "perfect wave". Sadly, erosion over the last 10 years has resulted in the perfect glassy waves running less often than they once did, but when the conditions are ripe, Kirra still offers up some of the world's best examples of big wave riding opportunities. When it's running, the experienced wave cutters are often seen being towed onto the monster swell with the help of jet skis and speed boats. Another appeal of Kirra is the fact it hasn't fallen prey to the prevailing glitz and glamour evident at many other popular Queensland beach spots, with old-school accommodation and weathered beach shacks still on offer for surfers checking in to this decidedly laid-back vibe. And just like its boomerang shape, this is one beach guaranteed to make sure you come back time and time again.

## Cape Kersaint, South Australia

Okay, so getting to this one is a little trickier than your standard beach, but believe us, it is well worth the trek! Located off the coast of Kangaroo

Island, winter is the best time of the year to visit this hidden gem, where offshore winds that blow from the north collide with the southern surge, creating a consistent swell. It is worth mentioning that when she's up and running at full speed, this break is only for the gun board riders. The rumbling walls of water hurl themselves at the rock shelf here with ballistic thrust, but there's a perfect barrel on offer for those brave enough to snatch a ride before the dramatic wipe out. Hazards here include rips, rocks and sharks - the surfer's holy trinity of terror.

## Scarborough Beach, Western Australia

Scarborough Beach is a firm favourite with families and teens in WA, providing a consistent set of moderate-sized waves to play around on all year round. It is not uncommon to find all types of riders on the break at Scarborough, surfers comingling with body boarders, swimmers and body surfers alike. Those wanting to mix things up a bit even more can ditch the fibreglass for a few hours and go for a session or two of kite or wind surfing - both are very popular on this stretch of sandy white paradise - especially in the windier afternoons. Scarborough is regularly patrolled by lifeguards, making this beach well suited to the travelling family wanting a more relaxed day in the sun, where mum and dad can casually sling a few board on the roof racks, while the kids can muck around in the sands or the shallows. The appeal in travelling here goes far beyond its golden sand and swell, with a foreshore of cafes and restaurants that comes alive at night. If the only window you have is the day, no worries, there are plenty of BBQ spots here too, as well as grassy areas for a quiet picnic to sit and enjoy the view. Scarborough Beach is about a 20-minute drive north west of Perth, with buses running regularly from the city.

# Take four

Holidays can be an expensive business if you don't invest wisely. But some tourist attractions are simply too cool to ignore and are well worth the price of admission!



## Colour Factory, USA

New York City is a vibrant and colourful place to visit at the best of times but checking out the city's much-hyped Color Factory in SoHo will take that feeling to a whole new chromosphere. Designed to celebrate the spirituality of colour, this flamboyant installation features a range of weird and wonderful rooms filled with creative artworks, ball pits and lighting displays. The price to get in will set you back an estimated A\$54. Now that's better than simply painting the town red, right?

## Burj Khalifa, UAE

When it comes to being on holiday and wanting to feel on top of the world, you should look no further than the world's tallest building, the Burj Khalifa in Dubai, UAE. This gargantuan skyscraper stands almost a full kilometre tall and is well worth the approximately A\$55 per person to enter the structure's observation deck. It's not just the views of the incredible desert and surrounding city-scape to take in, with an assortment of fun activities also on offer, such as a digital glass walk which simulates its own collapse, as well as a green screen photo wall where you can take home the perfect memento of you pretending to scale the lofty landmark.



## Harry Potter Studio Tour, UK

Walk in the footsteps of perhaps one of the most famous literary kids of all time, the bespectacled Harry Potter. Located in London, the Harry Potter Studio Tours takes visitors through all of the bizarre and wonderful worlds that Harry himself had once traversed, from studying at Hogwarts to traipsing through the mysterious Forbidden Forest. True fans will also get a kick out of seeing the authentic costumes worn on set during the filming up close, as well as some of the beautifully crafted props. The price for visiting such wizardry? Roughly A\$86 per adult and A\$70 per child.

## Hengdian World Studios, China

Sometimes referred to as "Chinawood", Hengdian World Studios in Dongyang is the country's mecca for all things cinema and television. Tourists can check out the many wonderful worlds that Chinese filmmakers have created over the years to shoot an assortment of successful projects. Labelled "zones", they include the Dazhi Temple Scenic Area, which boasts the tallest indoor statue of Shakyamun and is where films like *Two Peerless Heroes* and *Living Buddha Qigong* were produced. Other zones include the Hong Kong Street Zone, replicating how the popular destination would have looked back in the 19th century. The price for admission is approximately A\$80.



# Keep your cruising dream alive

Dining is a key part of your cruising experience, so to help you choose which ship you should sail on next, we're bringing you a series of comparisons of onboard dining.

The vibrant and varied flavours of Asian cuisine make for a delightful dining experience, so this week, we take a look at the Asian cuisine options onboard luxury cruise ships.



## Umi Uma & Sushi Bar Crystal Cruises

Umi Uma isn't just your typical Japanese restaurant, with master chef Nobuyuki "Nobu" Matsuhisa bringing his unique Japanese-Peruvian fusion food to sea onboard *Crystal Symphony* and *Crystal Serenity*. The restaurant is Nobu's only sea-going offering and brings all the flavours from his restaurant empire to the ocean. Enjoy unique combinations such as Nobu-style lobster with truffle-yuzu sauce or a dessert bento box with chocolate souffle with shiso syrup and sesame icecream. And at the sushi bar you can enjoy fresh sushi and sashimi. Umi Uma & Sushi Bar is open for dinner and reservations are required.

## Pacific Rim Regent Seven Seas Cruises

Drawing from cuisines across Asia, Pacific Rim onboard *Seven Seas Splendor* and *Seven Seas Explorer* offers guests the chance to indulge in favourites like spring rolls and seafood laksa. Pacific Rim features muted lighting and ocean views through specially designed windows in a lotus shape, a universal Asian motif. Other culinary highlights include Korean-style barbecue lamb chops, Thai green chicken curry and Chinese barbecue pork ribs. The restaurant is open for dinner and is included in your cruise fare, though reservations are required.



## Indochine & Kaiseki Silversea Cruises

Silversea offers two different Asian restaurants on its fleet of ships. Indochine provides a range of Asian cuisines from Indian and Thai to Vietnamese, while Kaiseki focuses solely on Japanese flavours. Indochine is one of the main restaurants onboard offering modern Asian fusion dishes, and as such doesn't require a reservation, nor does it cost extra to dine there. Kaiseki is a speciality restaurant and is open for lunch for no additional charge, with sushi and sashimi the main offering. At dinner the restaurant turns into a teppanyaki dining experience and does cost extra to make a reservation.





## Sushi Seabourn

Seabourn's Sushi is exactly what you would expect from a restaurant with such a name – delicious fresh sushi and other Japanese dishes served a la carte for dinner. Included in your cruise fare, the menu includes Hamachi, tuna, shrimp and other fresh fish products shipped from Japan to the restaurant and turned into caviar, small plates and a selection of maki rolls, sushi, sashimi and salads. In addition to dinner, guests can indulge in three different types of bento box for lunch – meat, seafood and vegetarian.



## Koko's Scenic Luxury Cruises & Tours

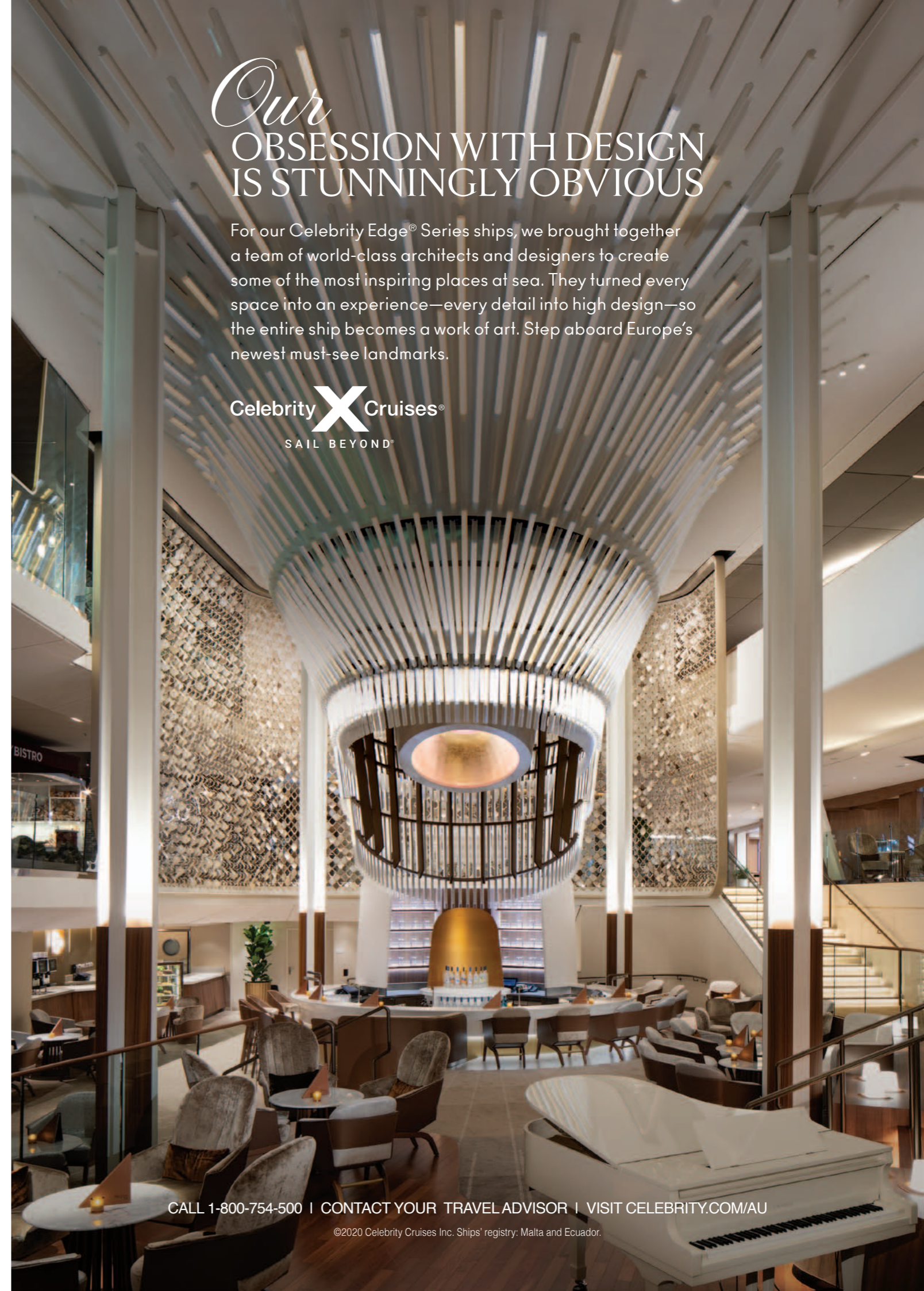

No reservations are required for Koko's but if you want to enjoy the teppanyaki you will need to make a booking.

# Make it at home

In these stressful times, we're often looking for a drink, so why not make one of our unique cocktail recipes at home!



## Tanna Coffee Espresso Martini

Vanuatu Tourism has shared this recipe with us, highlighting the island nation's coffee. Wherever you go in Vanuatu you'll find Tanna Coffee, produced on the volcanic island of Tanna. With over 100,000, these delicious-tasting beans help make a coffee that is perfect for an espresso martini.

### Ingredients

40mL vodka (if you like it lighter, replace some of the vodka with a nip of Baileys or Amarula)  
20mL Kahlua  
1 scoop of ground Tanna Coffee (Vanuatu Tourism suggests a medium roast)  
Ice cubes

### Method

Brew your Tanna Coffee to produce 20mL of fresh espresso. Add espresso, vodka, Kahlua and ice cubes to cocktail shaker and shake until frothy. Strain the mixture into glasses (so you don't get any ice cubes in your glass) and enjoy some of Vanuatu's finest produce in alcoholic form.
